» 5.1 Urban Resilient Futures: Zero-Emissions Building Retrofit Taskforce

City Council received an update on work completed by the Urban Resilient Futures: Zero-Emissions Building Retrofit Taskforce. The Taskforce has developed a set of recommendations for council to a dvance building retrofits, as existing buildings are currently the largest source of community carbon emissions in the community.

» 5.2 Pedestrian-Cyclist Overpass Over Highway 1 - Update

City Council directed staff to proceed to the detailed design for Option 1 for a proposed pedes trian-cyclist overpass across Highway 1. Option 1, the lowest-cost option of four presented to council, would create an overpass connecting the Burnaby Lake trails ystem to Claude Avenue.

» 5.3 Lakefield Drive Active Transportation Improvement Project - Preferred Option

City Council instructed staff to review a proposal to create active transportation improvements along Lakefield Drive, and return with additional design options for council's consideration at a future meeting. Active transportation improvements are designed to make it easier and safer for pedestrians and cyclists to travel along this route.

» 5.4 2023 Solid Waste and Recycling Fees and Related Bylaw Amendments

City Council approved new rates for solid waste and recycling service in Burnaby, which will take effect January 1, 2023. The fee increases for single-family, multi-family and row house properties will be adjusted as follows: the annual fee for 120L receptacles will increase from \$45 to \$50, 180L will increase from \$110 to \$130, and the 360L fee will increase from \$395 to \$400. Additionally, the City will phase out weekly pickup fee exemptions for multi-family co-op and strata properties over four years.

» 5.5 2023 Sanitary Sewer Rates and Related Bylaw Amendments

City Council voted to approve a 2% increase in sanitary sewer charges for 2023. The City will utilize reserve funds to avoid passing a major rate increase onto Burnaby taxpayers, as Metro Vancouver rates are set to rise by 7.6% in 2023.

» 5.6 2023 Waterworks Utility Rates and Related Bylaw Amendments

City Council voted to approve a 2% increase in waterworks utility rates for 2023. The City will utilize reserve funds to avoid passing a larger rate increase onto Burnaby taxpayers, as Metro Vancouver rates are set to rise by 2.8% in 2023.
